




The Northern Archaic Tradition from 5,500 B.P. to 2,500 B.P.

- ➤ Between 8,500 and 5,000 B.P. the boreal forest became fully established.
- ➤ By around 6,000 B.P. salmon may have started to spawn in the waterways of the Susitna drainage.
- ➤ Northern Archaic Tradition sites have been discovered along the Susitna River east of Talkeetna, and on bluffs above the Matanuska River dating to around 5,000 3,000 B.P.
- People migrating into the valley During the Northern Archaic period are most likely ancestors to the Dene (Athabascan) Dena'ina and Ahtna people who live in the Valleys, today.







Owing to the short time spent at most of the sites, our information about the houses on Cook Inlet is very scanty. Including the Indian houses of Kachemak





FIGURE 4. INDIAN HOUSE RUINS ON COOK INLEY.

- 4. HOUSE IV, KASILOF; S. NIEISEEA III; S. POLLY CREEK; 7. CHINITMA BAY.



PLANO VIEW OF CACHE PITS at Knik




Above: small depressions for dried berries. **Below:** larger depressions for large game & fish







Dene Tradition from 1,500 to present.




- ➤ Between 5,000 500 B.P. the Dena'ina people displaced the Alutiiq people in the Susitna Valley. The Dena'ina maintained annual seasonal subsistence activities
- which included:
 - Spring and Summer: waterfowl, egg collecting, collecting feathers,
 - freshwater fish
 - Spring and Summer: salmon harvest (all five species were harvested)
 - Summer: harbor seals and beluga whales
 - Summer and Fall: harvest berries
 - Fall: special trips made for caribou, bear, and sheep, moose
 - Fall and Winter: beaver and fur-bearers
 - Throughout the year: small game, ptarmigan and grouse






